language therapy. With this in mind we aim to help these children and families while they wait for their appointments by offering a private assessment with a private speech therapist while at nursery. Lucy will also be training our team in communication and speech development. As you may know Emma Hedge is our SENDCO at nursery, she works with many outside agencies to support children in their development and she will be liaising with families when children might benefit from support from Lucy.

Wiggly worms are a plenty in the woods! Kindergarten have been exploring why worms are such an important part of our eco-system. The children were fascinated to learn how worms break through the soil and eat decaying plant matter. We have a compost bin and this proved a very popular activity to fill it will straw, hay and leaves. The children loved the RSPB Big Garden Bird Watch last week so this was a nice segway into learning about the food chain. Sarah showed us a funny dance that the birds do to trick the worms to the surface of the soil. "Worms live under the ground."

We have also loved Charlotte's story bag about the 'Tiger Who Came to Tea' by Judith Kerr and playing new group games. We celebrated Chinese New Year by making the most ginormous Chinese Dragon, looking at the resources an the interest table (including chopsticks, calendars, ornaments and china plates). We had the most beautiful and serene traditional music playing in the woodland, chimes and songs.
