How Do We Support Pre-Writing?

Writing is an important lifelong skill and outlet to effectively communicate, express emotions, instruct, inform, create visions and improve one's ability to read.

'Research shows that for writing to develop, you should provide young children with opportunities to build their physical strength and control in the core, upper body, hands and fingers.' https://help-for-early-years-providers.education.gov.uk/literacy/writing

This is known as 'pre-writing' skills and these include sensorimotor input, (messages) that then create a response, (motor output). These skills all contribute to the ability of effectively holding and controlling mark making tools such as pencils and pens.

At St. Michael's, this ethos is woven into our everyday practice right from our youngest children in Ladybirds, through to our school leavers in Kindergarten. We believe that creating opportunities and providing resources through child led explorations, 'invitations to play' and 'provocations' effectively supports the children's

learning and development.








Hedge's Bakery has officially opened starting with 'Portrait Pizzas' where the children were encouraged to think about their features of themselves and each other. They have also made Peach Cobbler, Vegetable Soup, Bread Hedgehogs and Gingerbread People.

Emma noticed that many of the children are Star Bakers in the making because without instruction, they were kneading and rolling out the dough confidently. The children really thought about their creations and the features that they wished to highlight using dried fruit. Emma Hedge recounts, "the children used dried fruit to decorate and one child even used the fruit to represent the character's eye brows."









We have also been measuring ourselves on a large piece of paper and marking it off. We have been comparing and talking about height. Another popular activity was making blackberry paint and using the paint to print with.

We have been talking about Harvest and we have made lovely little hedgehogs using a fork to create the spikes. It was lots of fun rolling the toy tractors through the drippy, brown paint to make tracks in the fields.

Our Eco Philosophy is simple.... Leaving as small a footprint as we are able and passing on that simple message is at the core of St. Michael's environmental policy.

We aim to do this by challenging ourselves on everything that we as a Nursery consume and use, from what we eat, what we use, to what we play with.

Education is where it starts. We teach this through stories, puppet shows, props and visual aids, visitors, music, posters, bug hunts, recycling trips to the bins on site, videos of author Emily Hobson Martin reading her Hilda's Planet stories, growing plants, harvesting vegetables, learning about fungi and decay, the wood wide web, the sensory experience of sand, water, soil, grass, herbs and other natural resources.

Did you know that the collective noun for Ladybirds is 'loveliness'? We went on a Ladybird hunt in the woods and we were delighted to find lots getting ready to gather to 'overwinter'. When Katie Fox asked what we call lots of Ladybirds together, one little girl shouted, "I know, a lovely mess!"
